

These 'encinitas', or little oaks, will someday grow to majestic proportions, thanks to the generosity of Pardee Nursery and the dedication of these budding arborists!

TECC has teamed up with the two more antique stores to raise money for the Conservancy: Fourth Street Antiques in Temecula and J.B. Victoria's in Leucadia.

The Santa Ysabel General Store is the first store, which began partnering with TECC in early 2005. Vintage and collectible items are donated to TECC and consigned with the antique dealers.

The stores stock vintage items in all categories dating from the early 1800s through the 1970s including vintage clothing, kitchen and household items, western and Old California collectibles, garden/farm implements, books and magazines, furniture, costume and fine jewelry, glass and porcelain, paintings and prints and many other areas of vintage collectibles.

The Santa Ysabel General Store is located in Santa Ysabel (near Julian) in

the original General Store built in 1884.

Fourth Street Antiques is a quaint antique mall on Fourth Street in Old Towne Temecula. TECC items are located in Space 49.

### Outing sign-up procedure:

Contact the outing leader at 760-471-9354 or [information@escondidocreek.org](mailto:information@escondidocreek.org) to learn more about each week's trip and to sign up.

Registration is required in case there is a change of plans, and to manage trip size. All outings are led by our Executive Director, Geoffrey Smith, who is well-versed in the local land-use and resource management issues in the watershed. Meet 15 minutes prior to start time. Please, no dogs. Children are welcome on some trips when accompanied by parent or legal guardian.

### Wednesdays in the Watershed Series -

1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month, 9 am – 12 pm.

**Wed, Mar 1:** Hike to Bottle Peak, at 2195' it is the most prominent peak north and east of Escondido. Situated near Lake Wohlford Dam, this is a short but challenging hike. Meet at the Lake Wohlford Café, on Lake Wohlford Road across from the park. Outing on private land with permission.

**Wed, Mar 15:** Questhaven Retreat is privately owned by Christward Ministries in Elfin Forest, covering more than 600 acres. We'll quietly explore this beautiful open space, traversing the trails and a 'labyrinth.' Take San Elijo Road through San Elijo Hills 'Town Center,' past the school, past Hope Street, to Questhaven Road. Go south on Questhaven Road 2.5 miles to the gated entrance. Outing on private land with permission.

**Wed, Mar 22:** This special day-long joint Sierra Club outing will include lunch at Lake Hodges Overlook, and a ranger-guided Olivenhain Reservoir dam and filtration plant tour. Meet at the staging area parking lot of the Elfin Forest Recreational Reserve on Harmony Grove Road (Thomas Brothers map 1149 B1). Geoffrey Smith from The Escondido Creek Conservancy will talk about the preserve system.

**Wed, April 5:** Where does our water go? Why, San Elijo Lagoon of course! We'll see how this nearly 1,000 acre coastal wetland manages the water it receives from Escondido Creek. Meet at the Rios Ave trailhead: I-5 to Lomas Santa Fe exit; Drive west on Lomas Santa Fe Drive; Turn right on Rios Avenue; Drive to end of Rios Ave and park along the curb

**Wed, April 19:** Tour of TECC's 'Quarry' and 'Coler' properties on Harmony Grove road. We'll observe several restoration projects currently in progress, and learn from the experts what

makes a restoration successful. Meet at the intersection of Harmony Grove Road and Country Club Drive. Optional participation in a Land Trust Alliance restoration workshop on-site from noon – 5 pm.

**Wed, May 3:** Explore the recently-acquired 345-acre Derbas property at the Elfin Forest Recreational Reserve. TECC purchased this property in 2002, then 'flipped' it to the County of San Diego which manages it as open space in perpetuity. Meet at the Elfin Forest Recreational Reserve on Harmony Grove Road. Outing to closed area by permission.

**Wed, May 17:** The TECC-owned 'Coler' property is immediately south of the Elfin Forest Recreation Reserve. On this outing we'll visit this special place, and see first-hand the threat presented by the neighboring 17-unit 'Cielo Azul' proposed development. Meet at the Elfin Forest Recreational Reserve on Harmony Grove Road.

**Saturday, April 22:** Earth Day Service Project at Elfin Forest Recreational Reserve. Contact the TECC office or visit our website for details.

**Sunday, May 21:** The Escondido Street Fair. Volunteer at the TECC information booth to spread the word about our watershed! Call the office for details and to sign up for an hour or two of outreach! 'Tabling' is a fun way to help.

## Be Prepared! Here's a short checklist of gear to bring and wear on TECC outings:

### Clothing:

Light weight shirt (nylon is best), light weight pants (nylon is best), hat, sturdy boots, windbreaker, jacket

### Food:

2 quarts water, nuts, fruit, crackers, cheese

### Other:

cash, identification, day pack, extra clothes, extra food, first aid kit, whistle, sun screen, sun glasses, hiking staff
